PROVIDING HELP. CREATING HOPE. EMPOWERING THE POOR AND VULNERABLE.

In FY 2025–2026, Catholic Charities of Los Angeles continued to Provide Help and Create Hope by delivering essential services: food, clothing, referrals, emergency and transitional shelter, rental and utility assistance, taxi vouchers and health assessments for seniors, and Thanksgiving and Christmas programs.

The agency also: supported unaccompanied, undocumented minors through case management; offered counseling for individuals, groups, and couples; assisted with MediCal and CalFresh applications; provided day labor opportunities; and delivered immigration services, including citizenship applications, DACA renewals, permanent residency, and family petitions.

Additional services included: free haircuts and showers for people experiencing homelessness; mail services; household and baby supplies; mobile medical clinics; and independent living support for seniors. Nutrition education, trauma-informed therapy for domestic violence survivors, emergency assistance for individuals and families, and post-wildfire disaster case management and financial assistance further extended the agency's reach.

But, Catholic Charities of Los Angeles doesn't stop at Providing Help and Creating Hope. Inspired by Catholic Social Teaching's Option for the Poor and Vulnerable, Catholic Charities prioritizes those most in need and seeks to empower them. As Fr. David Theroux of St. Michael's College noted in July 2025, the poor must be participants in their own development, not merely recipients of charity—a message echoed by Pope Francis.

Case management services guide clients from immediate assistance to long-term self-sufficiency, serving as a bridge to independence. Adult education and life-skills classes promote personal growth and economic security, while wellness groups encourage healthy habits and community connection.

The Archdiocesan Youth Employment Services program provides job training, career planning, education, and placement for youth and young adults ages 14–24. The Employment Support Partnership assists more than 500 refugees, asylees, and immigrants with workshops, coaching, job placement, and transitional subsidized employment for CalWORKs recipients. CYO sports and summer programs foster confidence, resilience, and life skills among youth.

We are grateful to you, our generous donors, volunteers and supporters, who made it possible for us to Provide Help, Create Hope, and Empower the Poor and Vulnerable in FY 2025-2026.

Once again, this year's annual report tells the story of the many men, women, and children whose lives are being touched and changed by the work that we do in Catholic Charities.

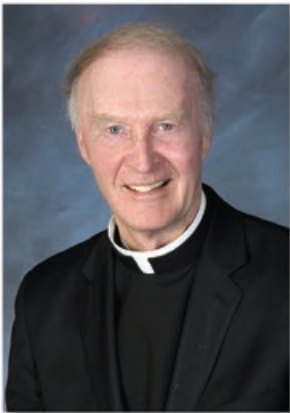
I am grateful to all of you who make up this community of compassion that is Catholic Charities. God bless all of you for your love!

Dear Friends of Catholic Charities:

Catholic Charities of Los Angeles is committed to manifesting Christ's spirit through collaboration with diverse communities by providing services to the poor and vulnerable, by promoting human dignity and by advocating for justice. The Board, staff and volunteers worked tirelessly in FY2025-2026 to spend the generous resources from our donors for the needs of the most vulnerable in our communities.

The victims suffering from the Los Angeles wildfires have major needs that Catholic Charities continues to address. We have 28 full-time staff providing case management, food, rent and construction assistance. We have served 7,628 individuals and 3,126 families.

Family-based immigration is the focus of Catholic Charities' Immigration Services. As such, the primary objective is to enable the unification of families. We strive to help promote family unity, self-sufficiency and integration through exceptional legal services for low income, vulnerable immigrant communities.

Too many young people are unemployed. This is clearly the experience of youth in Los Angeles County. Young adults (ages 19-24) had a unemployment rate of 13%. They are neither in school nor working. Catholic Charities has a program called the Archdiocesan Youth Employment Services. Its purpose is to alleviate some of the serious problems facing young people, such as high school drop-out rate, illiteracy, crime and unemployment. This is accomplished through partnerships with employers, community groups and educational agencies.

CARF is an independent, non-profit accreditor of health and human services. Through accreditation, CARF assists service providers, like Catholic Charities, in demonstrating value by the quality of their services and meeting recognized organizational and program standards. I am pleased to share with you that we are fully accredited.

Catholic Charities is grateful for the support of our public and private donors. Because of your generosity, we are able to provide creative solutions that have a lasting impact on the lives we serve.

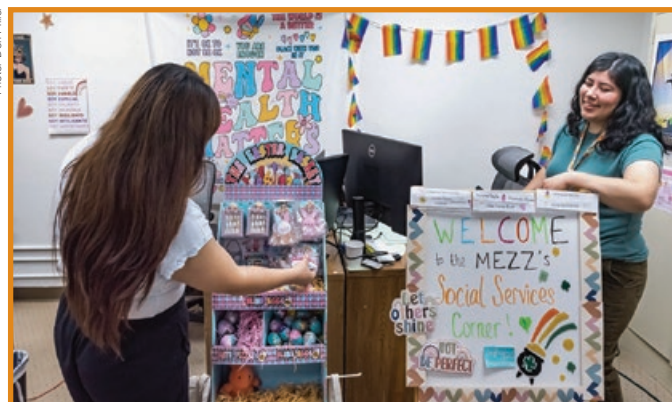

People at the Saturday Food Program at St. Robert's Center in Venice are able to charge their electronic devices. The program collaborated with multiple community groups to distribute hundreds of hygiene kits, shoes, clothing and more to the homeless community.
